





- VAC is the only HIV specialty clinic in the area
  - Largest HIV testing & PrEP provider in the area
  - Covers a 3,057 square-mile area (roughly the size of CT, and DE) and is home to more than 1.2 million people roughly the population of VT and WY







**Mission:** VAC is a non-profit HIV service organization that delivers culturally-appropriate sexual health & wellness services in south Texas; and, advocates for the Latinx population at the local, state and national level.

# **Challenges**

- **COVID:** COVID affected everyone. Leading to isolation, increased mental health concerns and increased substance use. For Latinos in the RGV, the COVID pandemic worsened the already bad health, social, and income inequities and raised fears of disparities in disease rates, exposure, testing, and prevention.
- Access to COVID vaccine, and to primary care services
- Latinos (largest racial and ethnic minority population in the US and the majority population in South Texas) continue to be disproportionality affected by HIV as well as other chronic health conditions such as cancer, and cardiovascular disease.
  - Prevention efforts previously led to promising declines in HIV among Latinos. However, progress has stalled in recent years, with new infections beginning to rise, particularly among Latino gay and bisexual men.
    - Not enough Latinos with HIV are aware of their status, and too few are receiving the HIV care and treatment that will help them live longer, healthier lives and get and keep an undetectable viral load.
    - Despite recent increases in PrEP use among Latinos, significant gaps remain.

### **Celebrating Successes**

- Able to quickly pivot to virtual medical, case management, support groups
- Rethinking for HIV outreach and testing events
  - outdoor community events testing, mailing at home testing and condoms
- Collaborating with Departments of Health, FQHCs and community organizations to provide COVID-19 education, outreach and vaccines
  - As of August, 40% of total COVID vaccines by all health centers in US were to Latinx
- Viral Suppression rate of 90% for our VAC | Westbrook Clinic
  - More than 90% of HIV DXs linked to care within 1 month many within a couple of days
- Annual client conference (VIDA vivir | inspirar | defender | amar) Nov. 19
  - A day of empowerment, health education, medication updates; mental health education and more. Virtual event





## Planning for 2022 and Beyond

- Virtual services: which do we keep
  - In-person opening for Casa Orgullo | LGBTQ+ Youth Resource Center
  - In-person National Latinx Conference on HIV/HCV/SUD conference
- Expand access to PrEP and PEP
- Continue work to eliminate HIV stigma and discrimination
- Expand onsite behavioral health services
- Continuing work addressing social determinates of health
  - Collaborating with other community organizations
- Continued advocacy
  - Expanded Medicaid, national health insurance program (preventive & primary care)
  - Access to health care (sexual reproductive health, LGBTQ+ care)
  - Immigration reform
- Reconnecting with community
